STUDY GUIDE FOR UNIT 3: TARGETS 2 (TUPAC SHAKUR, BIGGIE SMALLS)

Material from the reading by Collins

- 1. Know whether or not the crucial element of Biggie's persona--the intensity and violence of his subject matter--came from the intensity and violence of the environment that molded his imagination. Know whether or not hardcore rappers rhyming about blowing away their foes with 9-millimeter pistols are in a sense part of a grand and troubling tradition. Know whether or not the punishment for the five African American and Hispanic teens in the beating of the Central Park jogger stood up in court and was carried out. Know whether or not some have compared Biggie's gestures to minstrelry. Know whether or not, as parables, Biggie's tales advertise practicality and skill at negotiating. Know whether or not, in rhyme after rhyme, Biggie chronicles the risks of the "everyday struggle" on rough Brooklyn streets. Know whether or not, critical to the feedback loop of credibility is Biggie placing himself in a tradition of rappers whose words can change to bullets and back again. Know whether or not hip hop has built its epics in the very vortex of the struggle for existence and success. Know whether or not, according to Anderson, there are always people around looking for a fight in order to increase their share of respect, or "juice," as it is sometimes called. Know whether or not "The Ten Crack Commandments" is in a sense a Biggie "Wealth of Nations." Know whether or not Biggie's commentary is a call to moral reform rather than to mastery of "the game." Know whether or not Biggie's rule number one touches on one of rap music's greatest contributions to the analysis of American society: the elaboration of the mechanics of envy and jealousy. - 2. Know whether or not smoked crack moves from the pipe to the large surface of the lungs and thence to the brain where, within ten minutes, it induces a high that has been compared to a full-body orgasm. Know whether or not, as for the sellers of crack, money is ultimately the drug of choice. Know whether or not, according to Anderson, in the inner-city community, drug dealing thus becomes recognized as work, though it is an occupation that overwhelming numbers of residents surely despise. Know whether or not, according to Massey and Denton, housing discrimination that began in the 1950s was perfected in the 1960s. Know whether or not the dealers are, in principle, much closer to the American mainstream than are those they sell to. Know whether or not HOLC helped institutionalize the crediting of a whole population living in red-lined areas. Know whether or not the author thinks getting high on your own supply is a specialized form of embezzlement. Know whether or not Massey and Denton that HOLC practices were models for the Federal Housing Administration and the Veterans Administration that together completely reshaped the residential housing market of the United States. - Know whether or not, according to Morgan, black people are all winners when a space exists for brothers 3. to honestly state and explore the roots of their pain and subsequently their misogyny. Know whether or not the reference in "Another" to Sam Rothstein (central character in "Casino") is a reference to a man who loves both wisely and deeply. Know whether or not Morgan suggests that the rapper's hard exterior, especially with regard to women, is in part a defensive stance. Know whether or not a corollary to commandment five is to keep one's family and illegal business separated. Know whether or not failure to play the game correctly leads to all the consequences the would-be rags-to-riches entrepreneur wants to avoid. Know whether or not Kim's reference to her love as "concrete," again, suggests the kind of strength that love needs to have in a hostile racial and economic environment. Know whether or not. according to Morgan, denying the justifiable anger of rappers is empowering and strategic for black feminists. Know whether or not, in one of his raps, Shakur records his theory that Biggie and Puffy Combs were behind his being shot five times. Know whether or not the eleventh commandment is that one must stay in the crack game even if a viable alternative makes itself available. Know whether or not a comic figure, the mad rapper, is really dangerous. Know whether or not Biggie was unaware that even complete mastery of the game did not guarantee that disaster would be avoided. Know whether or not, at

the end of **"Born Again,"** Biggie's mother speaks about her son's worries about **"playa haters"** wounded by his success. Know whether or not the prelude to "Ready to Die" samples the Curtis Mayfield classic, **"People Get Ready."** Know whether or not **"Missing You"** is the closest thing to a **love ballad** on "Life After Death." Know whether or not, to rap artists, rap appeared to be an arena where one could go **as far as one's skills could take one**. Know whether or not the difficulty is that the street dialectic of **seeking and being endangered** by envy spills over into the rap world **as Biggie experienced it**. (p. 919-925)

4. Know whether or not, in the stigmatized world, stigma creates a constant ache in the organs of selfesteem at the same time that it makes it more difficult to eliminate that ache. Know whether or not, according to Loury, racial stigma consists of dishonorable meanings socially inscribed on arbitrary bodily marks, of **spoiled collective identities**. Know whether or not, **unlike the psalmist**, the gangsta desires to be protected from his foes and slanderers and to have the necessity and essential justice of his actions recognized. Know whether or not open appeal to the divine compromises the autonomy that makes the gangsta the master of his fate and the living law of his environment. Know whether or not one manifestation of rapper sensitivity and inventiveness is entrepreneurialism. Know whether or not the reality of street life causes the "Aristotelian principle" to be confronted with what might be called a "Plutocratic principle." Know whether or not Rawls distinguishes "benign envy" from "emulative envy" and "excusable envy." Know whether or not **Kant** would surely **approve** of the Biggie persona's gargantuan appetites. Know whether or not the concept of the "crew" so prominent in Biggie's music and in hip hop suggests that individualism is not all. Know whether or not part of the greatness of Biggie's body of work lies in its ability to express the **full reality** of the **gangsta ethic** and the "game" that grows out of it. Know whether or not Christopher Wallace exited the crack game and crafted the Notorious B.I.G. image as a means of escaping danger and want and carrying his neighborhood crew along with him. Know whether or not Biggie's final trip to California was his own effort to end the arms and death race that he knew had come to include Shakur's supporters and mourners. Know whether or not part of the tragedy of the deaths of Biggie and Tupac lies in the fact that they transmuted so many barriers not only by bragging about their differences but also by working with the surviving universals of our time. Know whether or not it is true that, as the hip hop community itself recognized in the wake of the murders of Shakur and Wallace, a crucial limit that needs to be observed is the one between the performer and the personae he creates. Material from the reading by Morrison et al.

- Know whether or not Tupac was named after a famous African leader of the 18th century. Know whether 1. or not, although Tupac was born and raised on the West Coast, he had strong allegiance to the East Coast. Know whether or not many speculate that the media coverage played a large part in hyping the East Coast-West Coast feud. Know whether or not one of the positive legacies that remain from the East Coast-West Coast feud is the **determination** to keep other artists from trudging down that **same negative** path. Know whether or not Tupac became bigger than the feud he helped to create. Know whether or not Tupac began his career with **Digital Underground** as a **roadie and dancer**. Know whether or not the lyrics to "2Pacalypse Now" became the center of a national debate. Know whether or not Tupac was the first rap artist to let his fantasies of revenge on police officers play out in lyrics. Know whether or not the prison imagery conjured by the name **Death Row** fits Tupac when one considers his numerous run-ins with the law. Know whether or not the role of dancer serving as **point of entry** to **recording** hip hop (as was the case with Tupac) has never been repeated in hip hop culture. Know whether or not C. Delores Tucker was enthusiastically supportive of Shakur's gangsta rap lyrics. Know whether or not the obscenity conviction of "Nasty as They Want to Be" was merely the latest against a long line of lyrics prior to 2 Live Crew. Know whether or not Dr. Tucker and her husband won their suit against Shakur's estate. Know whether or not more hip hop albums received parental advisory stickers than any other music genre. Know whether or not, in **1994**, government officials began a **four-year crusade** to rid society of a genre of music they deemed "pornographic smut." (p. 393-400)
- 2. Know whether or not Tupac's last film, "Above the Rim," was released posthumously. Know whether or not one can see that Tupac's stage identity as an outlaw or thug played out in the movie roles he landed. Know whether or not one of the informal rules on the streets of Harlem (as depicted in the movie "Juice") is that those who are deemed vulnerable can and will be subjected to violence and may be killed in order for kids to earn respect. Know whether or not Tupac's role as Bishop in "Juice" is powerful because the character he plays is only an extension of the outlaw/thug identity portrayed in his lyrics. Know whether or not one of Tupac's best acting performances was in the Hughes brothers' "Menace II

Society." Know whether or not a major contribution that Tupac made to hip hop culture involved his role in **countering the notion** that illiteracy is **commonplace** within the hip hop community. Know whether or not Tupac avoided reading works in the **African American literary canon**. Know whether or not Tupac **intellectualism** had a **profound impact** on his rap lyrics. Know whether or not Tupac clearly understood the **power of ideas** and the ability of those ideas to have **great influence over others**. Know whether or not Tupac's life was inherited from his father. Know whether or not Tupac's last album introduces Tupac as his **alter ago**, **Makaveli**. Know whether or not Tupac **supported Dr. Dre's decision** not to testify in court on behalf of **Snoop Dogg** in his **murder trial**. Know whether or not Tupac took opportunities to **disrespect Biggie Smalls** in public, but Smalls **refused to respond in kind**. Know whether or not "Don Killuminati" took **more than six months to make**. Know whether or not "The Don Killuminati" **ever made it to platinum**. (p. 400-406)

- 3. Know whether or not "White Man'z World" addresses several political issues, such as reparations, Black Nationalism, and class. Know whether or not "Hail Mary" ever quite caught on in the hip hop community. Know whether or not, undoubtedly, Tupac's street credibility was greatly enhanced in the eyes of fellow West Coast thugs for the barrage of comments that he directed toward his East Coast adversaries. Know whether or not the duress Tupac was facing inside and outside of Death Row Records served as a catalyst for the thought-provoking commentary on "Don Killuminati." Know whether or not the most popular (and socially significant) song on "Don Killuminati" is "Hail Mary." Know whether or not the development of Shakur's alter ego, Makaveli, established the basis for theories that Tupac faked his own death. Know whether or not rumors and conspiracy theories have the ability to alter our perceptions of reality, thereby becoming our reality, ultimately becoming the truths by which we live. Know whether or not, beyond music, there is also a Makaveli clothing line and a performing arts center dedicated to keeping Tupac's legacy alive. Know whether or not the rumors about Tupac still being alive largely came to an end once his murder was solved. Know whether or not Tupac used the philosophy espoused in "The Prince" to change the rap game through "Don Killumati." (p. 406-409)
- 4. Know whether or not, in songs such as "Death Around the Corner," Tupac's Outlaw persona faces revenge and retaliation against his enemies. Know whether or not, ultimately, the goal of an outlaw is just survival at all costs. Know whether or not an important tenet of the Thug Life ideology is the unrelenting embrace of death. Know whether or not Tupac's preoccupation with death was rooted in nihilism. Know whether or not, to be thugged out, or even to be in compliance with the notion of being a thug, was quite popular in hip hop culture. Know whether or not, when one takes into consideration the sum of his existence, Tupac Shakur emerges as hip hop's greatest iconic symbol. Know whether or not very few can walk among thugs yet be capable of building on the philosophy of political thinkers, and greater still, use these ideas to change hip hop forever. Know whether or not Tupac's lyrics. Know whether or not, more often than not, Tupac wrote lyrics that were mysogynistic and degrading to black women. (p. 409-413)

Material from reading by Peterson

1. Know whether or not Biggie's mother was much older than his father. Know whether or not, when Biggie's mother was informed of his truancy and blatant disrespect of the educational process, she decided to let it go. Know whether or not, during Biggie's teenage years, Brooklyn was caught up in the crack cocaine epidemic that plagued much of urban America at that time. Know whether or not it was not until his late teens that "Biggie" earned his nickname. Know whether or not Biggie's mother, in coming to America, had a plan that included Biggie's father. Know whether or not Wallace's first MC moniker was "Biggie Smalls." Know whether or not Biggie attended the same high school as Jay-Z and Busta Rhymes. Know whether or not, while growing up, Biggie avoided the mainstream hip hop artists like LL Cool J, Run-DMC, and Big Daddy Kane. Know whether or not Sean Combs has stuck with the same moniker throughout his career. Know whether or not, as far back as the Fat Boys, oversized MCs have used their weight as a gimmick or for artistic capital. Know whether or not Biggie's affinity for street life and hustling derived from economic lack in his own home. Know whether or not the name "Biggie Smalls" comes from a film, "Let's Do It Again." Know whether or not 50 Grand doubted that Biggie would make it big in the rap game. Know whether or not Wallace's physical stature and his sensible marriage to that stature with his artistic designations follow a powerful and entertaining legacy of larger-than-life MCs who made similar decisions. Know whether or not, essentially, Biggie lived a double life as a teenager. (p. 418-424)

- 2. Know whether or not "One More Chance" solidified B.I.G.'s appeal to his women listeners more than either of the two previously released singles from "Ready to Die." Know whether or not "Ready to Die" chronicles the **nihilistic inclinations** of a crook who is trapped at the **crossroads of lack and desire**. Know whether or not, to Biggie, death's call is comparable to the **alluring call of crack cocaine** for crackhead characters like Pookie from "New Jack City." Know whether or not, in "Everyday Struggles," Biggie's narrator exclaims that he wants to live forever. Know whether or not, while 1990s gangsta rap certainly elevated the level of attention to murder and gun violence in lyrics, old-school hip hop also had its run-ins with death. Know whether or not, for some artists, the lyrical theme of death serves as a way of selling more records. Know whether or not, in "Ready to Die," Biggie's narrator obviously exists in a world where material wealth is ubiquitous—hence his undying desire. Know whether or not, initially, the narrator in "Everyday Struggles" is doing very well. Know whether or not rappers who capitalize on reallife ghetto violence may find themselves, even as major-label recording artists, not that far removed from the perils of street life. Know whether or not, to say that rap lyrics influence or cause violence freely acknowledge the statistics that tell us that physical violence and murder occur at alarming rates in impoverished neighborhoods. Know whether or not critics of rap point out that a lot of the artists that talk death and violence really don't live the life they rap about in their songs. Know whether or not some have suggested that, in surviving violence on the streets, black criminals face limitations that white criminals like John Gotti do not. Know whether or not Biggie's father was not in his life too much beyond his toddler years. Know whether or not the "golden age" of hip hop was from about 1979 to 1987. Know whether or not the singles from "Ready to Die" clearly exhibit Biggie's most compelling hard-core narrative abilities. (p. 424-430)
- 3. Know whether or not Biggie makes it clear that being ready to die for material things is, in many real-life cases, the equivalent of already being dead. Know whether or not, on the "darker" tracks of "Ready to Die," Biggie's preparedness for death is glorified, and made sexy and appealing. Know whether or not there were a lot of women in Biggie's short and extraordinary life. Know whether or not, according to Coker, Biggie's reaction to Tupac's death was dismissive and contemptuous. Know whether or not, after Tupac's death, Biggie despaired of ever being able to make the haters love him. Know whether or not, after the party following the Soul Train Awards, as Biggie and his entourage caravan exited the party, a car pulled alongside Biggie's rented Suburban and seven forty-caliber nine-millimeter shots rang out. Know whether or not, just before his death, Biggie commemorated a newfound peace with God by tattooing parts of Psalm 23 on his inside right forearm. Know whether or not Biggie was married only once. Know whether or not "Ready to Die" was one of Biggie's least successful albums. Know whether or not, among the powerful women who mothered children for him, Lil' Kim clearly had a special space in Biggie's heart. (p. 430-433)
- Know whether or not, for **Biggie's funeral**, the fact that it was a **drive-by shooting** and that the shooting 4. took place in Los Angeles, so far from home for his homegrown Brooklyn audience, enhanced the tension in the atmosphere even further. Know whether or not, in many ways, the posthumous album "Life After Death" picks up exactly where "Ready to Die" left Biggie's growing audience. Know whether or not "Life After Death" features virtually ignores various subcommunities within hip hop culture, in favor of a general message. Know whether or not Biggie's second posthumous album, "Born Again," was released almost three years after his murder. Know whether or not "Living in Pain" stands out among hip hop culture's **posthumously produced materials**. Know whether or not the story and the controversy surrounding the unsolved murders of both Biggie and Tupac no longer make headlines. Know whether or not the labyrinthine mess surrounding L.A.P.D.'s corruption came to a head when the Wallace estate's civil suit was declared a mistrial. Know whether or not Biggie's impact on youth facing the same challenges he faced will sustain itself based on his short but incredible presence on the hip hop cultural landscape. Know whether or not as a beloved son of Brooklyn, Biggie was afforded a funeral procession through the streets of his neighborhood. Know whether or not "Kick in the Door" and "Ten Crack Commandments" are pure **DJ Premier-produced street bangers**. (p. 433-437)
