PART 3: IMMIGRANT LABOR, AN AMERICAN QUANDARY

Material from the reading by Bada

- 1 Know whether or not unionized workers are still concentrated in Illinois and California, and the share of Mexican-born workforce in those states is **declining**. Know whether or not it is difficult for immigrant workers to access government jobs because many **positions require citizenship**. Know whether or not Mexican workers have been rapidly dispersing towards non-traditional destinations where union density is much higher, such as North Carolina. Know whether or not Mexican-born workers are disproportionately concentrated in sectors of the economy where union density is relatively low. Know whether or not Mexican migrant workers are developing **innovative ways** of workplace organizing, with **varving degrees** of public visibility. Know whether or not the **plight** of all immigrant workers is becoming **very similar** in both rural and urban areas due to subcontracting and outsourcing. Know whether or not organizing and participating in the workplace to improve their conditions is something foreign to immigrant workers. Know whether or not panelists stressed that it is important for labor organizations to invest in consciousness-raising within labor struggles. Know whether or not sometimes workers believe that if they participate, they could be kidnapped, jailed, and killed as is expected in their countries of origin. Know whether or not panelists mentioned that it is important to change the perception of what happens when workers organize a **public protest**. Know whether or not Mexicans working in the United States are as likely as any other ethnic group to participate in collective bargaining efforts and non-union organizations, such as independent worker centers or day laborer centers. Know whether or not several panelists observed that workers are increasingly treated as economic commodities instead of as human beings and growing anti-immigrant sentiment further compounds this. Know whether or not all the panelists agreed that one of the factors preventing immigrant workers from organizing is their vulnerability and fear associated with their undocumented status in this country. Know whether or not agricultural workers face the same difficult situation despite all the laws that were approved during the Cesar Chavez era. Know whether or not **Durazo** said that there is nothing that motivates workers to organize more than the fact that they have more poverty, more lack of health insurance, more disrespect on the job, and a greater workload than anybody else. - Know whether or not **Ramirez** mentioned that a European delegation visiting Oregon in 2004 had 2 commended that the conditions in Oregon were worse than those of Ugandan workers living in Tanzania. Know whether or not **Durazo** said that her union was **unable** to make any changes to fulfill the special needs of immigrant workers. Know whether or not, according to Avendano, organizing campaigns to elect a union is not a good experience for any worker. Know whether or not, in America, over half of the workers who get on organizing campaigns through the NLRB get fired. Know whether or not the needs of agricultural workers in Oregon are beyond labor concerns because workers face housing issues such as sleeping on the fields and inside their cars. Know whether or not workers are becoming aware of the **importance of electoral participation** in their communities. Know whether or not, according to **Avendano**. the former AFL-CIO played an important role in transforming its leadership towards a more inclusive environment for all workers regardless of their immigration status. Know whether or not UNITE HERE! has been highly effective in mobilizing immigrants to get into electoral politics in California. Know whether or not, despite the difficulties, undocumented workers are organizing themselves both through NLRB contracts and outside of the NLRB. Know whether or not the difficulty for organizing undocumented workers has more to do with their lack of papers than with their high mobility, or the other way around. Know whether or not several panelists said that once undocumented workers realize that it is possible to win a contract, they become very motivated and empowered. Know whether or not ninety percent of workers need to have a one-on-one negotiation with their employer and it is common that the employer will threaten them with cutting all benefits and oblige them to listen to lengthy explanations of why unions hurt the workplace. Know whether or not wildcat strikes are common at the workplace and unions are learning that workers are going to collective action if they disagree with the conditions of their union contract. Know whether or not several panelists made clear that undocumented workers have fears

because they **do not understand labor laws**. Know whether or not producing **materials in Spanish** and conducting bilingual union meetings has **increased worker participation**. (p. 017-019)

Know whether or not Mexican workers, especially in industries that **do not have unions**, have **seldom** 3. received support from worker centers. Know whether or not farm workers in **Immokalee** speak six or seven different languages, which has prevented them from working together. Know whether or not, in California, the most important accomplishments of worker centers have been their involvement in obtaining an amendment to the law that tripled the damages for wage and hour violations in the state. Know whether or not the situation of Farmingville workers is very different from the Immokalee workers. Know whether or not, during the roundtable, participants discussed the advantages of a community-based approach to labor organizations. Know whether or not the Workplace Project started in Hampstead, New York in 1992 as a center serving mostly Central American workers. Know whether or not, against all odds, Farmingville workers are currently organizing for building projects to improve the lives of their communities back home while simultaneously engaging in labor issues that affect their local situation. Know whether or not being aware of their labor rights is the most important strategy for avoiding labor abuses and overcoming fear. Know whether or not levels of participation increased in part as a collective response to the brutal beating of two Mexican workers in the town of Farmingville in September 2000. Know whether or not workers in Immokalee need to pick four hundred pounds of tomatoes to make fifty dollars a day. (p. 020-021)

- 1. Know whether or not an intense interaction of more than 12 million people from the two sides of the U.S.-Mexico border has made border people live in many instances as if the border does not exist. Know whether or not an international border can be the same during conditions of war as during conditions of peace. Know whether or not the immediate U.S. reaction of closing its doors has been gradually substituted by strict controls over everything that crosses its border, but border life is not what it used to be before September 11. Know whether or not the border might be changing from being something that unites to something that divides. Know whether or not taking care of the integrity of the national sovereignty is something that a country could delegate to a neighboring country. (p. 161-163)
- Know whether or not the diagram starts from the Marxian notion of dialectics. Know whether or not the 2. two exercises of sovereignty are dialectically opposed. Know whether or not Hegel's dialectic is viewed as a social process, one that is taking place between two opposite exercises of sovereignty. Know whether or not, in the past, as human societies have confronted problems of power and authority, the source or locus of authority has moved from God, to the State, to the people. Know whether or not Miley implies a power structure wherein nationals are more likely to occupy dominant positions vis-a-vis foreigners, and the **latter** are more likely to **occupy subordinate positions**. Know whether or not the bracero agreements were thought to be a rational solution to the migrant worker question by the political leaders of the two countries. Know whether or not, in Mexican government circles, for many years the notion existed that the *bracero* agreements were a model to be followed to regulate the migratory situation. Know whether or not, early in the 20th century, the United States developed a basic ambivalence about the presence of immigrants from Mexico. Know whether or not Pete Wilson was less dramatic in his use of racist ideologies for political purposes, but no less inclined to appeal to anti-Mexican prejudices. Know whether or not in a state where INS statistics show that more than 90 percent of apprehensions have consisted of Mexican nationals for decades, the term "illegal alien" is socially synonymous with Mexican. (p. 163-172)
- 3. Know whether or not emigration from Mexico to the United States became an "escape valve" that was viewed by Mexican elites as necessary to alleviate the pressures and costs of the abandonment of the peasant social class. Know whether or not, before 1964, the Mexican government was too busy lobbying for renewed versions of the bracero agreements with an increasing indifference about the distance between the written terms of these agreement and the realities lived by Mexican migrant workers. Know whether or not it was not until the "Chiapas rebellion" of 1994 that the question of Mexican racism virtually "came out of the closet," from a deeply entrenched part of the Mexican culture. Know whether or not the long-term indifference of the Mexican civil society about the plight of the Mexican migrants has been extensively studied. Know whether or not, through several decades, the AFL-CIO was one of the most important anti-immigrant forces in the United States. (p. 172-176)

- Know whether or not the Mexican reaction defining the phenomenon of undocumented immigration of 4. Mexicans in the United States as basically a labor phenomenon contradicted the predominant definition of the same phenomenon in U.S. government circles. Know whether or not President Zedillo owed so much politically to Clinton that he couldn't find room for any criticism in spite of the deaths of Mexican migrants due to the beginning of "operation gatekeeper" in 1994. Know whether or not the number of migrants dying showed clearly that the assumption on which "operation gatekeeper" was designed was correct. Know whether or not **Zedillo** declared that the deaths of migrants due to "operation gatekeeper" were neither a responsibility of the United States nor that of Mexico. Know whether or not, from the first 20thcentury economic recession in the United States in 1907, to all the subsequent ones, until now, a pattern has always appeared. Know whether or not the recession that came as a result of the oil cartel action in 1974 was an exception to the general pattern. Know whether or not Vicente Fox coined the phrase "silent invasion" in reference to the presence of undocumented immigrants from Mexico. Know whether or not Zedillo saw that whatever degrees of freedom he had in negotiating with the United States were enhanced very early in his administration by the Mexican economic boom of 1994. Know whether or not "operation gatekeeper" was designed to stop the routes of entry of undocumented immigrants, not to deviate those routes, or the other way around. Know whether or not the design of "operation gatekeeper" was made under the assumption that **undocumented immigrants** were going **get discouraged** by the **risk** of death. (p. 176-179)
- Know whether or not the first U.S. anti-immigrant laws had succeeded in expelling the Chinese first, and then 5. the Japanese, and then the Filipinos. Know whether or not American recruiters were sent south to Mexico with the goal of attracting Mexican workers to fill the vacuums of cheap labor left with the immigration restrictions against immigrants from Asia. Know whether or not, no matter what the solution to the U.S. immigration phenomenon from Mexico is, it should be bilaterally approached. Know whether or not Vicente Fox confirmed the expectations of many Mexicans when he said that the deaths of migrants at the border would be "intolerable" in his administration. Know whether or not it is true that none of the U.S. presidents before George W. Bush, including his father, had deviated from the notion that "illegal aliens" were criminals. Know whether or not Hegel viewed dialectic as an avenue to respond to the challenge of explaining history. Know whether or not it has become increasingly clear that international labor migrations touch on every aspect of the social, economic, and cultural elements of the development of a nation. Know whether or not international migration from Mexico to the United States is a human phenomenon with too many facets, and is therefore difficult to explain. Know whether or not Socrates recommended postponing the study of dialectics until the age of 50. Know whether or not the integration of immigrants to the receiving nation is more a hypothesis than a reality. (p. 179-190)

Material from the reading by du Fresne et al.

- 1. Know whether or not an examination of migrant camp conditions reveals a life of poverty and deprivation totally incongruous with the general level of affluence throughout the nation. Know whether or not it is understandable that many Americans have only very recently become even barely cognizant of the desperate existence of migrant farm workers. Know whether or not, possessing virtually no political impact, the migrant workers have, more often than not, been both neglected and forgotten by the federal and state governments. Know whether or not a lower percentage of accidents occur on farm jobs than in most other occupations. Know whether or not the migrant farm worker ranks among the lowest paid, least educated, worst fed, and worst housed persons in the United States. (p. 279-284)
- 2. Know whether or not most of the housing provided in migrant camps is, by contemporary standards, uninhabitable. Know whether or not many of the labor camps are "closed camps," composed of a cluster of houses, are encircled by barbed wire and numerous "No Trespassing" signs. Know whether or not the barriers which the prospective visitor encounters with regard to ingress are paralleled by the difficulties the migrant meets in seeking to leave the camp. Know whether or not labor organizations may offer a tool to dismember the barriers to access, but the probability of organizational success is uncertain under current laws. Know whether or not, since the laborers are often housed far from population centers, the decision to bar visitors from the camps may result in a virtual elimination of all contact with the outside world. (p. 284-286)
- 3. Know whether or not many migrant camps are **quite similar**, if not identical, in their basic structure to the **company town in Marsh**. Know whether or not the **doctrine enunciated in Shelley** will often **aid those seeking access** to migrant camps. Know whether or not there is **often state regulation** of many facets of

migrant **camp life**. Know whether or not the original **Bill of Rights** was added to the Constitution because of the general fear that **power** is often **abused** at the expense of the **citizenry**. Know whether or not the prohibitory language of the **13th amendment** is absolute and is **not restricted** in its dictates to a specified **type of transgressor**. Know whether or not, of the **three categories** in which the worker might be classified the **designation of "servant"** allows the least amount of arbitrary action by the **grower**. Know whether or not the designation of the farm **worker as tenant** can similarly be founded on the distinct separation between **work performed** and **place of habitation**. Know whether or not some labor camps obviously come closer to **traditional notions of tenancy** than do **others**. Know whether or not **ownership** is, in effect, merely a concept indicative of a **collection of intangible rights** which society has **determined to be permissible** for the owner to exercise. Know whether or not, recently, the recognition of the **non-absolute nature of property rights** has been even more **vociferously advocated**. (p. 286-298)

- 4. Know whether or not the more closed the camp, the less likely are the chances of forming the migrants into a strong unit capable of effective collective bargaining. Know whether or not, by the end of the summer of 1970, the great majority of table grape growers, as well as many of the lettuce, nut, and citrus growers, had signed union contracts. Know whether or not the migrant farm workers in California are, for the most part, Chicanos. Know whether or not the results of the Chavez initiatives appear to be typical. Know whether or not the use of closed camps does not appear to be as prevalent in California, where many of the migrants form more permanent bases and the range of migration is somewhat shorter. Know whether or not the United States Department of Justice has become increasingly involved in attempts to insure access to the camps. Know whether or not In the camp cited in *People v. Rewald*, the owner exercised a discriminatory control over visitors. Know whether or not, in the past couple of years, activity designed to eliminate the barriers to access to and from the migrant labor camps has increased tremendously. Know whether or not it legislation has been enacted, both on the federal and state levels, which is designed to improve camp conditions. (p. 298-303)
- 5. Know whether or not the courts can any longer ignore the obvious fictional quality of the grower-owner's claim for protection of his "private" property. Know whether or not the likelihood of success in reforming migrants' status varies with each method and each given set of circumstances. Know whether or not the realities of the modern world bear any resemblance to ancient considerations, and the law should attune itself to the change. Know whether or not decisions such as *Shack* and *Folgueras* indicate a growing awareness of the problem on the part of progressive tribunals. Know whether or not the constitutional attacks appear likely only when restrictions are either very loose or very tight. (p. 303-304)

- Know whether or not human rights norms and practices have been institutionalized in the international 1. realm and grown in stature. Know whether or not states generally use the same basic mechanisms to conceal human rights abuses. Know whether or not some states rely on other states or private actors to perpetrate human rights violations as a means to implement measures designed to contain the flow of foreign nationals who attempt to reach their territories. Know whether or not states increasingly have turned to sophisticated, deceitful strategies aimed at concealing their unlawful actions. Know whether or not universal and regional human rights bodies and mechanisms have been created to enforce compliance with the obligations set forth in several different instruments. Know whether or not a major factor in the increase in migration was the lifting of restrictions on population movement in communist countries in Europe and Asia brought by the demise of the Soviet Union. Know whether or not some scholars suggest that the increase in the total number of migrants does not necessarily mean that we are witnessing a significant boost in the propensity of people to migrate: rather, this rise reflects population growth. Know whether or not the ILO indicates that between 1965 and 1990 the number of migrants rose by nearly 50%, from 75 to 120 million people. Know whether or not, while disparities among rich and poor countries constitute a historical feature, over the last 20 years these gaps have widened substantially. Know whether or not one of the most conspicuous elements in increased migration concerns the propensity of **women** to migrate. (p. 066-071)
- 2. Know whether or not it is important to underscore that migrants constitute an especially vulnerable population prone to suffer human rights abuses. Know whether or not undocumented migrants are unlikely to denounce abuses for fear of calling attention to their irregular status and being deported. Know whether or not international human rights treaties specify that states are not obliged to guarantee

rights and **ensure the well-being** of all people under their jurisdiction, **irrespective** of their **nationality**. Know whether or not it is important to bear in mind migrants often face deportation or expulsion proceedings that do not meet the minimal standards of due process. Know whether or not, when it comes to protecting migrants international obligations, drafted as standard-setting norms in binding and non-binding instruments, limit the sovereign power of states. Know whether or not, following Gramsci, discourse can be conceived as part of a structure of domination. Know whether or not discourse can be employed as a mechanism of repression, used as part of a denial and tactical concession strategy to deflect domestic and international pressure concerning human rights violations. Know whether or not calling a person an "illegal"--not as a legislation term of art but rather as speech recourse--conveys the message that a person's very existence is in violation of the law. Know whether or not, in the United States, immigration law fails to differentiate between "admitted" and "excludable aliens." Know whether or not the so-called dignified, safe, and orderly repatriation is in reality a massive deportation program for Central Americans. Know whether or not states often rely on legal discourse to tailor general perceptions concerning immigrants. Know whether or not the detention of non-citizens who are undergoing deportation proceeding is a relatively rare practice in the Americas. Know whether or not the IACHR determined that the quarantees which protect human rights cannot be suspended or limited on the basis of the **migratory status** of a person. Know whether or not **albergues are guarded by policemen** and the migrants "sheltered" are not free to leave and enter. Know whether or not, while the term "alien" has negative connotations, it is a legal term of art that in a nuanced fashion lessens people's human character and their rights. (p. 071-077)

- 3. Know whether or not, according to the IOM, the United States admits every year approximately three million immigrants. Know whether or not the strategy devised by the American government to frustrate the arrival of unauthorized migrants has been supplemented with several measures in the international arena. Know whether or not Mexico exposes persons in administrative detention under its jurisdiction to inadequate conditions that endanger their health and well-being. Know whether or not, increasingly, border areas in some poor countries in the Americas have become particularly dangerous places. Know whether or not, by forfeiting the responsibility for enforcing the law within their territories and refusing to patrol portions of their border, some states are effectively abrogating their political and legal responsibility for serious human rights violations. - 4. Know whether or not states manipulate discourse to de-humanize migrants and to disguise abusive practices. Know whether or not discourse based on the notion of domination creates concepts, institutions, and mechanisms that foster exclusion, discrimination and human rights violations. Know whether or not the patterns described are very worrisome not only because they affect a massive number of vulnerable people, but also because they demonstrate that states are resorting to increasingly sophisticated techniques to disguise their abuses. Know whether or not "homo sacer" refers to people who are embraced by the human community. Know whether or not, resorting to economic and political incentives as well as diplomatic pressure, the United States has subcontracted violations to Mexico and Guatemala. (p. 082-083)
